The 2018 Student Planner has arrived and we're giving you a couple of tips on how to get the best out of it!

The Bayview College Student Planners support organisation and better communication. With these planners as part of the classroom experience, students are more likely to keep track of their assignments, set personal goals, and enhance communication between teachers, students and parents.

Four main ways student planners can enhance learning are:

1. Improved Organisation:

Organisation does not come easily to most students. It requires a conscious effort and a great deal of planning;. Student planners provide an easy and creative method of taking note of their commitments and deadlines. It gives them a systematic approach to recording necessary information on a daily basis.

2. Tracking Achievements:

The hard work and dedication of The Class of 2017 has paid off with outstanding levels of personal excellence achieved. We are incredibly proud of our students with all students who completed the assessments for VCE and VCAL passing.

Bayview College is proud to share with you the many wonderful results of our Year 12 students.

Congratulations goes to our 2017 Bayview College Dux Charlie Ryan with an ATAR rank of 94.8 His subject results are a testament to his excellent work ethic and his passion for learning.

Two scores above 40 in 2017 for Mathematic Methods and Further Mathematics.

After taking a gap year, Charlie plans to complete a double degree in Science and Commerce at Monash University.

"I'm really happy with my results. I worked hard this year and it's nice to see it all pay off" said Charlie.

All of our graduating students have been exceptional leaders within the school and broader community.

Significant achievements this year include:

- 11% students achieved an ATAR above 90
- 20% students achieved an ATAR above 80
- 25% students achieved an ATAR above 70

BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE PROGRAM UPDATE

With the new school year now underway it is time to review where we have come in our teaching program for 2018.

With our new WIFI network now operational and NBN being 'switched on' in the next few weeks, students in Years 7-11 are asked to bring a charged laptop to school each day as part of the 'BYOD' program (Bring Your Own Device).

Year 12's also have the option to bring a device, which helps with the increased online delivery of valuable learning resources and activities.

In Year 7 and 8 the device should be a Chromebook as per our dialogue late last year. In light of a number of local primary schools having existing BYOD programs in place we have decided to honour this by allowing incoming Year 7's to use the device that was part of the Grade 6 education. We only ask that no games are installed and that Chrome is the default web browser. All other Year 7's should have a Chromebook.

For families who may find obtaining a device financially prohibitive at this time, we have a number of laptops available for loan in the library.

BAYVIEW COLLEGE STUDENTS READY FOR NEXT PHASE WITH UNIVERSITY OFFERS RELEASED

After sweating out the summer in anticipation, students of Bayview College's very successful Class of 2017 found out on Tuesday which University course they had been accepted into as first round offers were released.

75% of Bayview College students applied for tertiary placements through VTAC in 2018, several also applied interstate, with other graduates choosing to take a gap year, or pursue full-time employment.

Of the students who applied for University 100% received a first round offer, with 85% of these students gaining an offer into their first preference.

Bayview College Principal Dr Michelle Kearney said "It is wonderful to see these students who had worked so hard commence the next stage of their journey on a pathway towards their chosen career. This is the true measure of success. Students are not always sure about their career pathway and that is why we work with the students to provide the best advice to help them achieve their long term goals" concluded Dr Kearney.

The Class of 2017 course selection saw trends continue in the Health Sciences fields with students receiving offers to study Optometry, Psychology (Honours), Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy and Biomedicine, with a number of students receiving offers for double degrees in Nursing/Midwifery.

Outside of the Health Science field students were offered placements in areas such as Design, Commerce, Teacher Education, Fine Arts, Surveying (Honours), Construction, Wildlife & Conservation, Animal & Veterinary Biosciences, Science and Mechanical Engineering.

Bayview College dux, Charlie Ryan, 18, was excited to receive an offer to Monash University to complete a double degree in Science and Commerce.

"I was thrilled to receive my offer to study at Monash University." said Charlie

"I'm looking forward to studying Science and Commerce as I have thoroughly enjoyed the content in class and believe this area of study plays to my strengths."



Charlie will take a gap year working in Portland before moving to Melbourne in 2019.

Kaitlyn Boyer also received the news she was waiting for; an offer from Swinbourne University of Technology to study Design, the course of her choice.

"Now I have received my offer I'm waiting on confirmation of accommodation,"

"I'm so excited to be moving to Melbourne. I'm really looking forward to it."

Once Kaitlyn has completed her course she hopes to work in a team environment creating amazing designs.

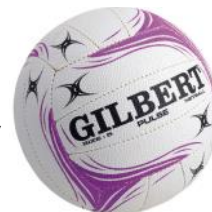
